Power blackout

Toni and Bettina make their mark at the Copenhagen climate change conference

AQUA Merimbula's filmmakers, Toni Houston and Bettina Richter, are returning from the Copenhagen climate change conference thrilled to have got their message about Australia's favourite icon, the Great Barrier Reef, out to so many peo-

Speaking to the News Weekly from Copenhagen, Ms Richter said: "While the world's

decision in Copenhagen fell far short of many people's hopes, AQUA's Great Barrier Reef message went out far and wide."

AQUA was the only Australian event to be selected for the official cultural program of the United Nations Climate Change Conference and on Wednesday, December 16, a special preview edition of AQUA was screened at the Pumpehuset Club

Copenhagen as Danish band, Safri Duo, played alongside.

More than 350 people stood and watched the entire film, with many dancing and applauding at the end of each chapter, Ms Richter said.

The screening fell in the middle of a fraught week in Copenhagen with many of the crowd having spent the day in tough negotiation.

At the end of the film, writer/director, Toni Houston, and producer, Bettina Richter, were invited to the stage to take a bow alongside, Safri Duo to rapturous applause.

Attending the screening as part of the Australian Delegation to COP15, Queensland Climate and Sustainability Minister Kate Jones, said: "I congratulate AQUA filmmakers, Toni Houston and Bettina Richter, on their successful screening and stunning contribution to global education of the reef's importance. This will raise international awareness of the vulnerability of the Great Barrier Reef and help argue to strengthen the case for an international deal that will help heal the

Ms Jones pointed out that many leaders of the 192 nations represented at COP15 highlighted the Great Barrier Reef as a key location at risk of climate change and in need of protection.

"As custodians of the worlds largest coral reef, Queensland needs to galvanise international action on climate change to protect the Great Barrier Reef long-term," Ms Jones said.

Uffe Savery of Safri Duo said: "We had an amazing response to AQUA dance. Many of the crowd came purely to experience a unique night blending our live percussive sounds with Toni and Bettina's amazing underwater

He added: "AQUA is a film with vision, originality and musicality, and has also a very important mes-

sage. We are looking forward to creating original compositions for the full feature which we hope will get funding next year.'

AQUA is the first film of Wish Bone Films, founded by Toni Houston and Bettina Richter. Fusing the Emmy award-winning underwater cinematography of David Hannan with the percussive beats of one of Europe's biggest dance acts - Safri Duo - AQUA tells the history of the Great Barrier Reef, without words.

Despite their success in Copenhagen, Ms Richter and Ms Houston continue to look for funding and a cinema distributor for their film in order to make the full feature documentary, which they hope will be able to roll out to cinemas nationally and internationally by the end of 2010.

AQUA storms on to national stage

Merimbula filmmakers Toni Houston and Bettina Richter are overwhelmed with the interest shown in their film 'AQUA'.

Since the launch of the official fundraiser at the Aquarium Wharf Restaurant on Friday, October 23, news has spread far and wide about their production that highlights the plight of one of Australia's most treasured icons, the Great Barrier

"Everything just seems to be happening for AQUA," Ms Richter

"We had a very successful fundraiser at the Wharf Restaurant, and since then ABC Television has done a story and Dr Mike Kelly has premiered the movie at Parliament House.

"We're really excited with the amount of interest and support given to the movie and hopefully it will make a difference to climate change debate and protecting the

ABC TV flew into Merimbula on Wednesday, November 18, to film a report that appeared during yesterday's, Tuesday, midday news and last night's 7pm news bulletin.

National Radio's Fran Kelly interviewed the two women at 6.20am on Monday and their story was part of the lead on the ABC's 7am state news bulletin yesterday, Tuesday.

Federal Member for Eden Monaro, Doctor Mike Kelly, attended the fundraiser, and along with Climate Change and Water senator Penny Wong, screened AQUA at Parliament House on Monday, November 26 on the cusp of the decision on the Carbon Reductions Pollution Bill.

"Copenhagen is so close and to receive this much support has been amazing," Ms Richter said.

Ms Houston and Ms Richter will take AQUA to the United Nations Climate Change Conference at Copenhagen in December.

Dr Kelly paid tribute to the filmmakers: "AQUA tells the story of the Great Barrier Reef under the impact of climate change."

"If we don't get our carbon emissions target right, we could lose the reef.

"I would like to pay tribute to the efforts of Toni Houston and Bettina Richter for doing our region proud with this magnificent and important production.



AQUA's film fundraiser at the Wharf Restaurant, Friday, October 23, was a huge success, the film's producer and organiser of the evening, Bettina Richter, said.

The AQUA fundraiser went above and beyond our expectations. The evening was a carbon neutral event, with all carbon emissions from the night offset by Pyramid Power.

Pyramid Power provided a generous donation as well as covering the cost of the evening, which enabled all money raised to go towards producing and taking AQUA to Copenhagen in December for the United Nations Climate Change Conference.

With only seven weeks to go until the conference, the filmmakers are now focused on the last stages of post-production, and planning their screenings in Copenhagen.

They plan to organise a special premiere screening of AQUA for the Bega Valley community on their return.

Copenhagen in their sights

filmmakers Bettina Richter and Toni Houston are embarking on the project of a lifetime, they are off to the United Nations Climate Conference Change (COP15) in Copenhagen to show their film 'Aqua' as part of the official cultural program.

Aqua highlights the story of the Great Barrier Reef blending spectacular reef footage with immersive sounds of contemporary music.

The project brings together the filmmaking team of Toni and Bettina as well as acclaimed natural history filmmaker Tina Dalton, Emmy Award winning cine-matographer David matographer Hannan, Europe's international chart-topping DJs Safri Duo and Australian talent Endorphin.

The goal of Aqua is to expose a young international audience to the plight of one of the world's most treasured icons.

"The Great Barrier Reef may be dead by 2050 if nothing is done as well as the millions of sea creatures that depend on the reef," said Toni.

"It is a shocking fact but it is a good example of just what is at stake during this conference."

Aqua is a project Toni says she dreamt up five years ago as a way to get young people to connect with the story of the reef.

"I have always had a passion for wildlife, however I wanted to break away from the traditional mould and the 'voice of god' narration for which wildlife documentaries are known," she said.

"We are aiming to engage young people who are the future movers and shakers.

"It is a critical message and the problem we were faced with was how you tell that story to young people 15 to 25 in a way that is interesting to them.

'We all know the story and we are saturated with words I think expressing the message to music it will be able to reach more people," said Toni.

Toni and Bettina have teamed up to create Wish Bone Films.

The pair met one year ago in the carpark of the Pambula Kindy Gym where they say they instantly clicked.

"We started talking and realised we both had similar backgrounds, moved here for the lifestyle, to get away from the Sydney madness and raise our children," said Toni.

"However I think we are both busier now than we ever were before because Aqua has taken

The pair has a number of events lined up during COP15 including a public performance at the famous Copenhagen Pumpehuset (The Pump House).

They also have an official function to welcome the Australian Embassy COP15 delegation.

"This is our more seriaudience Kevin ous Rudd, Penny Wong, Peter Garrett and all the Australian representatives will be there," said

Bettina.

They will be showing a 12-minute version of the film Aqua which they are working on at the moment.

However they will also produce a 75-minute feature length film for cinema distribution.

The short film will premier in Bega for the Bega Valley Festival youth event before they take it

"It will be like a dance party/Aqua launch and local youth will be the test audience," Bettina.

The pair say they were very excited and looked forward to being in Denmark for COP15.

"I think it is the biggest most important event of our generation, people from all over the world are going to be there," said Toni.

"It is some pretty serious stuff and we are going to be there in the middle of it with our little film about the Great Reef," Barrier Bettina.

Aqua will be the only film event on the cultural program and the pair feel they are ambassadors for all of Australia and the Great Barrier

The project has been

endorsed by a professor Ove Hoegh Guldberg from the University of Queensland who is one of the world's most eminent coral scientists. Toni and Bettina have

also secured a major sponsor and partner in Pyramid Power who will be helping them to get to Denmark. As the Official Local

Sponsor of AQUA, Pyramid Power will support their two fundraising events.

Pvramid Power's support of the night will ensure that all money

raised will go directly into the film.

'We are just delighted to be supporting local filmmakers with this important environmental project," said Rachel Choy, general manager of Pyramid Power.
